

Newquay

he surfing capital of Cornwall has a decidedly boho vibe, and it's fun to watch the surfers ride the waves as they come rolling in off the Atlantic. During surfing festivals, Fistral Beach becomes the centre of the world for many, but familyfriendly Newquay has plenty of other attractions to occupy everyone.

Discover Newquay's evolution from fishing port to surf mecca on the town trail, take a boat ride out to sea,

browse the eclectic range of shops or get up close to a vast array of marine life at Blue

Perranporth

iscover one of Cornwall's most spectacular beaches (see below), where miles of soft, golden sand stretch far into the distance while huge whitecrested waves roll in from the Atlantic. The extensive sand dunes are home to birds and butterflies and tiny sunbathing lizards.

The busy town has plenty of places serving up traditional Cornish food, along with many cafés and bars catering for the beach crowd.

Holywell Bay

njoy the broad sweep of golden sands of this beautiful bay with the spectacular Gulls Rocks standing sentinel, as you can see on the right.

At low tide you can explore the grotto-like Holywell Cave with its calcium deposits, but don't get cut off by the tide. The wreck of an old Argentinian coaster can also be seen just offshore at low tide.



Crantock Beach

ere by the estuary of the Gannel River you'll find a large expanse of dunes and a golden sandy beach, popular for swimming, snorkelling, surfing and wind-surfing, with board/ canoe hire on the beach. Dolphins accasionally visit too!


It's owned and looked after by the National Trust and as well as cafés and toilets there are places to hire boards and canoes.
