OPEN TOP the Lizard Explore the beautiful scenery, wonderful beaches and rugged coasts of the Lizard peninsula.

Dartmoor Explorer A scenic ride over the wild moorland landscapes of Dartmoor from Plymouth or Exeter.

OPEN TOP Discover Exeter See the sights of this cathedral city from an open-top bus.

OPEN TOP Exmoor Coaster Up and down some of the steepest roads in the land through dramatic scenery where Exmoor meets the Bristol Channel.

## Penzance | Land's End | St Ives | Penzance

If you want a quicker ride out from Penzance to St Just, Geevor Tin Mine or Pendeen, or a speedier trip back to Penzance, use this bus service - your adventures by bus ticket is valid on this route too.

Light up the Land's End sky. Watch out for extra evening trips... There are also occasional firework displays... Check out the website or look out for posters and flyers.

Get off the bus, get off the beaten track and get great gulps of intoxicating fresh Atlantic air in your lungs.

And you can catch a later bus back further on without having to retrace your steps.

One of the great joys of walking along any of the paths shown is all the birds, plants and other wildlife you are likely to encounter on the way.

Some sections will be a bit steeper than others and some might be a little rough under foot, so do make sure you're wearing suitable shoes.



the Mousehole Mousehole has narrow streets filled with small shops, galleries and restaurants.

Buses will try to stop wherever it's safe - just raise your arm in good time so the driver sees you.

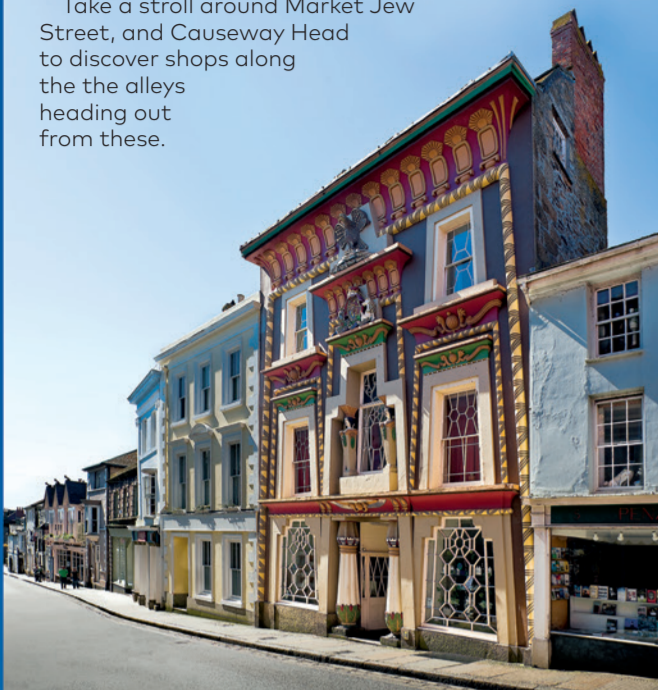




## Penzance

Near the top of Chapel Street, the town's most historic thoroughfare, is the Egyptian House, built in 1836 during a national craze for Egyptology, while further down is the Turk's Head, thought to be the oldest pub in the town.

Take a stroll around Market Jew Street, and Causeway Head to discover shops along the alleys heading out from these.



## Newlyn

Art is never far away in this part of Cornwall and these galleries showcase the very best of national and international contemporary art, as well as work by some of the best artists currently working in the region.

## Minack Theatre

Cornwall's world famous open-air theatre, created by Rowena Cade in the 1930s, is carved into the granite cliff and set in glorious gardens overlooking the spectacular panorama of Porthcurno Bay.

Theatre season is May to September, but it's a great place to visit during the day, with exotic sub-tropical gardens adding colour.

Discover how Rowena built this place, then relax in the café that overlooks the theatre and soak up the magic that is Minack.

It's closed when matinée performances and children's storytelling performances are on - check before visiting.

## Porthcurno

As you can see in the picture below, the beach at Porthcurno is just stunning. It has soft sand and a steeply shelving beach, but the stream at the top of the beach is ideal for children to paddle in.

There are cafés and toilets nearby and spectacular walks leading away from it.

## Telegraph Museum

This was the hub of international cable communications from 1870 to 1970 and a training college for the communications industry until 1993.

During the Second World War, secret tunnels were dug by Cornish miners to house an underground building and complete telegraph operations, and these bomb-proof, gas-proof tunnels provided 14 secure cables out of the UK to its allies. It's a fascinating place to explore.



Enjoy cakes freshly baked by the museum's chef, and beautifully prepared seasonal salads using organic leaves from chef's own vegetable patch. Fish is sourced from nearby Newlyn, smoked meats from St Ives, and the Cornish clotted cream comes from the family-run Trewithen Dairy - delicious!

## Geevor Tin Mine

Mineral mining in Cornwall began 4,000 years ago, and by the 19th century, Cornwall became the world's leading supplier of copper. By 1860, tin was Cornwall's most important metal export and this continued through much of the 20th century.

Hear the story of tin mining and go underground to go back in time and learn about the people that worked these mines.

## Sennen Cove

With a few shops, nice cafés and a great pub in a beautiful setting, Sennen Cove is a delight. Whitesands Beach is ideal for swimming.

The Roundhouse and Capstan Gallery is a showcase for Cornish art and craft, with work by popular Cornish artists. It was built to house the capstan wheel which used to winch boats up and down the slip, originally part of the winding gear of a local tin mine before the advent of steam.

## Land's End

Putting out into the Atlantic Ocean, this is the most westerly point of England. Enjoy a coffee, lunch or delicious cream tea, or visit the craft-workers at Greeb Farm. There's a shopping village, too, and a resident artist in the Penwith House gallery.

Gaze out to the Longships Lighthouse. Further out are the Isles of Scilly, then nothing until America. You could take the 1-mile walk to Sennen Cove with wild flowers all around and seabirds wheeling overhead.



## St Ives

Surrounded by gorgeous beaches, this pretty town arcs around the harbour with fishing boats bobbing in the sea. There are trips round the bay to take, or wander around the historic web of cobbled streets to discover charming independent shops, interesting galleries, and great cafés and restaurants, whether you want a quick cappuccino or nice meal.

Artists have flocked to St Ives for many years and it still has a buzzing creative scene. Take a look at the famous Leach Pottery, founded in 1920, which has contemporary exhibitions, as well as pottery for sale.

And don't forget the sandy beaches with sparkling seawater ideal for swimming, sunbathing and, of course, building sandcastles!



## Tate St Ives

With stunning views over the Atlantic Ocean, this gallery showcases works by the St Ives Modernists like Barbara Hepworth and Ben Nicholson, alongside an ever-changing programme of thought-provoking exhibitions.



## St Michael's Mount

The rocky island crowned by a medieval church and castle is a spectacular sight out in Mount's Bay off Marazion, and you can walk across at low tide (at high tide there are boats to ferry you).

It's still home to the St Aubyn family and a small community in the village. Enjoy the astonishing gardens and tour the castle to discover its rich history and strange tales.
